By order of the President recruiting stations are established at Baltimore, Havre de Grace, Broad Creek, Chestertown, Queenstown, Kent Island Landing, and other places. All claims for slaves that may be enlisted will be laid

* THE STATE AND COUNTY TAXES FOR 1 1863, are now due, and the undersigned 'ollector for the First Tax District of Kent county, hereby gives notice that the Tax Books are in his hands, and the amounts due by the Tax Payers are made out, and he is ready to receive them. He most respectfully solicits prompt payment, as the demands upon the Collector for this year, both by the State and County, are urgent, and will not permit indulgence. If Tax-Payers desired, there would be no difficulty in promptly settling their Taxes; but neglect of duty is often the cause of expense, which in many cases exceeds the tax itseif. The demands of the State this year, however,

must of necessity be met more promptly than heretofore, and the wants of those who have claims against the county will compel the collector to be more rigid in his collections. He bopes, however, that the Tax Payers will be prompt in their payments and thus avoid the penalty for neglect of duty.
