AN ACT prohibiting the sale of spirituous or fermented Liquors in the several counties of

the State on the day of Election. SECTION 1. Be it enacted by the General Assembly of Maryland, That it shall not be law. ful for the keeper of any hotel, tavern, store, drinking establishment or other place where liquors are sold, or for any person or persor directly or indirectly, to sell, barter, give or dispose of any spirituous or fermented liquors, ale or beer, or intoxicating drinks of any kind, on the day of election hereafter to be held in

the several counties of this State. SEC. 2. And be it enacted, That any person violating the provisions of this act shall be liable to indictment by the Grand Jury of the county where the offence is committed, and shall, upon conviction before any Judge of any Contains 256 Acres, Circuit Courts of this State, be fined a sum not less than fifty deliars, nor more than one hundred dollars for each and every offence, one- There is a sufficient quantity of TIMBER and half of the fine to be paid to the informer, and the other half to the County Commissioners for the use of public roads.
