THE MORMON ARMY AND WORSHIP .--

A Mormon sensation letter to one of the New York papers figures out the fighting capacity of the Mormon militia, and places the number of men enrolled at 25,000, but not more than one-fourth of these would be serviceable in actual warfare .--The force, however, is badly organized and poorly equipped. There is a "Mormon Temple" now in full blast at Williamsburg, N. Y., where a strong corps of elders is at work proselytizing. Last Sunday the "temple" was packed with a congregation composed of English and Germans of the poorer class. An English elder in snuff-colored clothes harangued the saints upon the glory of the religion which had stood the test of thirty years, despite the ridicule of the world and "all the stories the newspapers could hatch up." He claimed that the Latter Day Saints were so much like the former day saints "that you can scarcely see any difference between us." The leading missionary says that it is the desire of Brigham to form an Eastern Utah; and judging from appearances, Long Island has been selected as that delectable locality. Every town and village on the island will be visited by missionaries, and, if possible, the nucleus of a Mormon congregation will be planted at each point.
