In 1813, in the midst of our war with Great Britian, Congress designated the whites as citizens and the others as persons of color. As late as 1820 this distinction is kept up by Congress. I 1820, in the charter of the city of Washington, the corporation is authorized to suppress gatherings of slaves, free negroes and mulattoes. Now, if Congress had Earle, and no vote had been taken up to regarded these people as citizens it would not have given the corporation any such power. Wm. Wirt, the Attorney General, one of the greatest lawyers in the country, in 1821 gave the opinion that free negroes were not citizens within the meaning of the constitution of the United

that winter plowing made the crop less liable to injury from insects.

4th. It was held that the nearer plowing and planting come together, other things being equal, the better was the chance for a good crop.

5th. That light sandy land should by no means be plowed in winter. Some of the members advocated different views on some of these points, but I am correct as to the general result. Many of the largest farmers had done no winter plowing for some time, and this of itself is strong evidence against its utility; and from my own reading, observation and experience, I see no reason to doubt the general correctness of the conclusions.

The next subject for discussion was "Fertilizers," such as the guanos, phosphates, complete manures, &c., as distinct from manures produced on the farm. The subject took an extended range, and some important facts were elicited, which I will endeavor to give in my next. But as marked preference was given for the action and economy of some fertilizers, I will be careful neither to use your paper as a free advertising medium nor to injure any manufacturers, but at the same time it would seem right that those manufactured fertilizers which a majority of the Club who have used them fairly pronounce the best should have prominence in these reports. But I will take time to consider, deferring at the same time,
