ABOLITION OF THE INCOME TAX .- The United States Senate has struck out of the tax and tariff bill the income tax section, 34 Senators (including all the Democrats) voting to strike it out, and 23 voting in favor of its retention. It is understood that among the Senators who were absent, more than enough to have made a clear majority of the whole body would have voted in the affirmative. Mr. Sherman has since stated that the finance commitrelating to the income tax, which was phia, for \$6,000. agreed to, thus insuring the triumph of right and justice, in behalf of which the press generally throughout the country has stood up so resolutely, backed by the imperative popular will, against an inquisitorial and odious measure of oppression. There is scarcely room now to doubt but that the House will promptly follow this example of the Senate, by receding from its own position on the income tax. Whether it does or not makes little difference, for the emphatic expression of the Senate will prevent any reenactment of the law, which expires by limitation after the present year.
