THE WAR IN EUROPE-First Battle .-The first engagement between the French and Prussian forces took place on Tuesday last. According to a Paris telegram of Tuesday night an official despatch was received there from Metz announcing that the French army had assumed the offensive, crossed the Saar, invaded Prussian territory, and a serious engagement had resulted, commencing at eleven o'clock and terminating at one. The French stormed the heights which overlook Saarbruck, and their artillery drove the Prussian forces from the town, but whether it was occupied by the French or not, is not stated. The Emperor assisted at the operations, "and the Prince Imperial, who accompanied him everywhere, received on the first field of battle his baptism of fire." Nothing in regard to the affair has been erable importance to the French. On the a very serious loss. other hand, the Prussians may have fallen back to draw the enemy further into the interior. Saarbruck is about fortyfive miles from Metz, and has been the scene of many important contests.

A later dispatch brings a Prussian account of the fight, which states that "a small detachment stationed at Saarbrucken was attacked by three French divisions. After a sharp action the position was abandoned, the Prussions falling back on their supports. The loss was trifling."

It is asserted positively that the first great battle is at hand, and will be fought not later than Monday next.
