ed, the following Act of the Legislature, passed March 24, 1865, is published : CHAPTER 191. AN ACT prohibiting the sale of Spirituous or Fermented Liquors in the several Counties of the State on the day of Election. SEC. 1. Be it enacted by the General Assem-

bly of Maryland, That it shall not be lawful for the keeper of any hotel, tavern, store, drinking establishment, or other place where liquors are sold, or for any person or persons, directly or indirectly, to sell, barter, give, or dispose of any spirituous or fermented liquors, ale or beer, or intoxicating drinks of any kind, on several counties of this State. SEC. 2. And be it enacted, That any person violating the provision of this Act shall be liable to indictment by the Grand Jury of the County where the offence is committed, and shall, upon conviction before any Judge of any

Circuit Court of this State, be fined a gum not less than fifty dollars, nor more than one bundred dollars for each and every offence, onehalf of the fine to be paid to the informer, and the other half to the County Commissioners or the use of public roads. A. B. WHEATLEY, Sheriff of Kent Co.
