This attacks only our most thrifty growing trees, either in early spring, when vegetation firsts and partial vegetation, when abundant rains suddenly force out a luxurant growth. Peculiar methods of culture undoubtedly influence the causes of blight; but upon this there exists a wide range of opinion. Clean culture, and repeated stirring of the soil, while it may in many instances be conducive to most beneficial results, will often cause total destruction of a pear orchard. In seasons of zymotic, fungoid or fire blight, highly cultivated trees fall eary victims to the scourge, while those cultivated in grass, with an annual topdressing of manure, usually escape the conta-
