State of Maryland, by Article 14, Section 1, directs amendments to the Co tion to be made as follows:

The bill or bills, proposing the amendment or amendments, shall be published by order of the Governor, in at least two newspapers, in each county, where so many may be published, and where not more than one may be published, then in that newspape and in three newspapers published in the City of Baltimore, one of which shall be in the Ger. man language, once a week, for at least three months, preceding the next ensuing general election, at which the said proprosed amendment shall be submitted, in a form to be prescribed by the General Assembly, to the qualified voters of the State, for adoption or reie tion. The votes cast for or against said pro posed amendment or amendments, severally shall be returned to the Governor, in the manner prescribed in other cases, and if it shall appear to the Governor that a majority of the votes cast at said election on said amendmen or amendments, severally, were cast in favor thereof, the Governor shall, by his proclamation, declare the said amendment or amend ments, having received said majority of votes. to have been adopted by the people of Maryland, as part of the Constitution thereof, and thenceforth, said amendment or amendments shall be part of the said Constitution. When

two or more amendments shall be submitted in manner aforssaid, to the voters of this State. at the same election, they shall be so submiton separately."
