PROCLAMATION. And whereas the following act of the session, 1880, chap. 417, proposes an amen ment to the Constitution, to wit: CHAPTER 417.

sec. 5. After the election for judges as hereinbefore provided, there shall be held in this State, in every fifteenth year thereafter, on the Tuesday after the first Monday in November of such year, an election for judges as herein provided; and in case of death, resignation, removal or disqualification, by reason of age or disqualification, by reason of age or mental Household Goods, Notions, Nov-
