Robbery at Lynch's Station.

The postoffice at Lynch's station, in this county, and the store-room of Mr. E. L. Covington was entered on Wednesday night last or early Thursday morning and robbed. The postoffice was robbed of \$35 or \$40 worth of stamps and a new pair of gaiters beloning to Mr. W. H. Dudley, the postmaster. The store was robbed of \$8 or \$10 in money; no goods were missing; two pair of shoes were found next morning in front of the store, evidently having been dropped by the thieves in their haste to get off. Entrance was forced into the grocery room adjoining the store, but finding the store-room door locked another entrance was gained at the front of the store by boring a panel out of the door. The postoffice adjoins the store-room. No clue to the perpetrators has yet been discovered.
