The hall was filled to overflowing every evening, and we are told that it was not a rare thing for a single individual to purchase a half-dozen "reserved seat" tickets after gaining admission into the hall .-This could be done for no other purpose than to secure prize numbers. These gift concerts are clearly in violation of law, as will be seen by the following sections under the head of "Lotteries," in the Code of Public General Laws of Maryland: 159.
