DEATH OF A WELL KNOWN FORMER KENT

COUNTIAN .- Mr. Edwin Crouch, a former resi-

dent of this county, where he filled various of-

fices of profit and trust, died in Baltimore on Thursday of last week, aged about 76 years. Mr. Crouch was elected sheriff of this county in 1859, was tax collector of the first district in 1865-66, and was elected register of wills in 1867, serving until 1873. In the latter year he was a candidate for re-election and in the nomination carried the third and fourth districts, Mr. Samuel Comegys, his opponent, carrying the second and fifth, and tying in the first district. Another nomination election was ordered n the first district, to take place two weeks from the date of the first, which, after an animated contest between the friends of the respective candidates, resulted in another tie. This was perhaps the greatest anomaly that ever took place in Kent county politics and resulted in the rerement of both candidates. When the nominating convention met, Mr. William Stevens, who had run as a candidate for clerk of the ircuit court against Mr. D. C. Blackiston, was prevailed upon to accept the place on the ticket for register and was elected. Mr. Crouch removed to Baltimore in 1875 and obtained employment n one of the tobacco warehouses. For several years past he had been in feeble health and his mind had also become somewhat impaired. He
