"Since the introduction of the self-binder the most important work in the harvest field is the shocking of the grain, and I am not sure that it it depends greatly upon the binding. It is im-possible to make a good shock out of bundles shaped and poorly bound; but many through ignorance or indifference, or both, fail to make good shocks out of bnudles well-shaped and well-bound. A self-binder rightly operated leaves no excuse for poor shocks. The saving and curing of grain depends more upon the shock than upon anything else. It must be large enough to offer a successful resistance to storms, and yet not so large that the air cannot penetrate

to all parts of it, to cure the grain and dispel any moisture which may come from outside sources. It is plain that there is just the right shock, and all others must be wrong. "To build the right shock is an easy matter The first point is always to set the bundles firmshocking—the work can be done so much better Tickings, Flannels, Shirtings, &c. and more quickly. Let each person take two bundles and set them against each other, so that the cap sheaf, gather the tops of the standing bundles in your arms and draw them together.
