State and City Politics.

IMPORTANT ISSUES. Politics in Baltimore have been booming for ten days past. The Republicans have hope only in fusion with some independent movement and are playing their cards to this end. Findlay, Keyser and other so-called Democrats are "in for anything," to beat the regular Democracy, and Judge Brown, a prominent reform democrat, has been prevailed upon to serve the fusionists. He will make a strong candidate without a

Upon the other hand Mr. James Hodges, dyed-in-the-wool reformer, has consented to be the candidate of the regular Democrats, and the Times says the popular impulse in favor of Mr. Hodges is too powerful for the politicians to resist, even if they wanted to, and his candidacy has hamstrung the fusion movement so far as Democratic support goes. Mr. Hodges must first beat Mayor Latrobe, however, for the Democratic nomination.

If the Democratic municipal ticket should be beaten it would have a disastrous effect in the counties, and might also give the city delegation in the Legislature to the Republicans and fusionists. The Legislature elects a United States Senator, a governor, a treasurer and two police commissioners. The governor, treasurer and comptroller will elect insurance and tax commissioners, so that the party that wins this fall will get complete possession of the State

The Legislature is the great stake for which the Republicans are contending and they are not to be blamed for their zeal in that direction. Why any Democrat should allow personal feeling or factional animosity to lead him to aid them in such a vital movement is a mystery.
