## Funeral of Vice-President Hendricks.

The funeral of Thomas A. Hendricks, late Vice-President of the United States, took place at Indianapolis, Ind., on Tuesday with impressive ceremonies and surroundings that indicated the profound respect in which he was held by the American people. The evidences of respect and regret were sincere and universal and it is estimated that more than thirty thousand strangers were in the city. Ex-President Hayes occupied a carriage in the funeral procession. President Cleveland, from considerations of

public duty, decided not to attend the funeral. The Secretaries of State, of the Navy and of the Interior and the Postmaster-General, however, represented the executive department, and Justices Matthews and Blatchford the Supreme Court. There were also delegations at the funeral from the Senate and House of Representatives. Throughout the country, in hundreds of cities and towns, memorial meetings were held on Tuesday in honor of the distinguished dead. At Ford's Opera House, Baltimore, a largely attended memorial service was held, at which Judge William A. Fisher and John P. Poe, Esq., were the principal speakers, and addresses were also delivered by Hon. Barnes Compton, Rev. Dr. Murkland and others.




