THE GREAT PEACH CROP.

Some judges put the total peninsula peach crop at 15,000,000 baskets—ten millions of which are expected to be shipped by rail and five millions by water. The great crop of 1875 was about 6,000,000 baskets, and f teen millions is doubtless an overestimate of this year's crop, yet it will be much larger than '75 without a doubt if the season is favorable. If the greatly increased means for handling and facilities for transportation justify present promise and expectation, the crop of the present year is likely to be a paying one, and those who expect to get peaches for nothing will be disappointed.

THE CROP IN KENT. The following estimates are of growers within reach of railroad stations. They are not, of course, absolutely correct in each individual case, but as near as can be reached, and upon the whole will be very close the total crop.
