The Board of Public Works Clothed With Full Power to Enforce the Law and Make it Effective.

The following leading editorial from the Baltimore Sun of Monday is plain and the point. If, as stated, the officers of the fleet complain that they have no authority to use force, and are instructed not to jure the dredgers in making arrests, it the duty of the board of public works to asrived such instructions, for it is hardly possible that they could have emanated from the board itself. This matter should be thoroughly sifted, and if it be found that any officer connected with the oyster navy has given instructions that would impair the efficiency of the force and prevent the faithful execution of the law, it will be priwith the dredgers and should be promptly dismissed from the service. The following is the Sun's editorial, the sentiments of which we heartily endorse

The open defiance of all State authority by a band of organized lawbreakers, engaged in dredging oysters on forbidden grounds has reached a point where forbearance and moderation in dealing with them becomes a grievous wrong. That the police power of the State should be set at naught, the officers sent to enforce obedience either put to flight or captured, the armed vessels of the State either driven off or boarded and their armament destroyed, constitutes a chapter of humiliation which has awakened public indignation to a degree which lemands recognition on the part of those who have this matter in charge. It is well to understand where the responsibility rests. The legislation upon this subject has been changed in some particulars at to have pleased that branch of the State thing better to do. But standing out conspicuously in all the acts is the authority needed to suppress the violators of law, in reference to which public sentiment is now so thoroughly aroused. The board of public works, composed of the Governor, the comptroller of the treasury and the State treasurer, is armed with all the authority necessary to make the oyster police force efficient. Their duty is to purchase for each of the boats of the fleet such arms and amnunition as will make them efficient. They appoint the commander of the force, and the deputy commanders, who have charge of each steamer or sloop, and they have the absolute power of removal for neglect
