Primary cases, that is, where people have not been vaccinated before, should always be attended to at once, and where persons doubt of a former successful vaccination it should be done over again. A good, healthy vaccination is believed to be good for seven years if it "took well." In some instances it is said to be good for life, but no man can tell that. A bill will be introduced in the Legislature providing for a period of three years during which the foreclosed property may be redeemed; the deed in the meanwhile, instead of being handed over to the mortgagee, to be held for the interim by the register of deeds. It is stated that at least 5,000 mortgaged farms in Central and Western Kansas have been abandoned, and that a general exodus is going on from the "arid zone" of the State, where successive disasters have overtaken settlers and the 'flery breath of the Mexican sirocco" has ghted crop after crop.
