Death of Capt. Wm. Archibald.

Captair, William Archibald, a prominent citizens of the second district, died of brain trouble at his home in Kennedyville on Monday evening, the 2d instant, in the 64th year of his age. The deceased came to this county from Pennsylvania a num ber of years ago as captain of a vessel engaged in freighting lime. By industry and economy he succeeded in a few years in saving a sufficient sum to purchase a vessel for himself and continued the freighting business on his own account. He was rewarded with success and finally aban doned the water and purchased real estate and engaged in agricultural pursuits. In this occupation he was equally successful and in the course of time amassed a hand some estate, embracing some of the finest lands in the county, and became one of our most independent citizens. Though not is known as a politician, Captain Archibald was always closely identified with the interests of the democratic party, and while never having filled any political position of trust, he had frequently represented his district in county conventions

The deceased was a prominent member of the Presbyterian Church at Kennedyville, and he will be greatly missed not only by his church, but by the entire community in which he had so long resided, and by whom he was held in the highest record.
