GOVERNOR SWANSON, of Virginia, is one of the great men of the South. His speech at the Bankers' convention at Atlantic City last Wednesday was a thrilling voice of courage and determination from that section. He closed with these words:

"At the close of the war the ballot was given to the vicious and debased. In MILLINERY but after years of self-sacrifice we have recovered. By legislation we have practically eliminated the negro from Southern politics. We will stand together on this question as we have never stood on and quality. any other. We will treat the negro kindly, but, so help us God, we will hold him in his place for his own good and for the South's salvation."

The Election Law Issue.

The Republican candidate for Governor, Mr. George R. Gaither, in his speech of acceptance declared that the paramount issue was the election law, and that the Republicans proposed to make their fight on what they term the restoration to the people of the full and free right of suffrage.

So far as we are concerned we would be perfectly willing to make the fight on that issue. The election law as a whole is not at all objectionable to the Republicans, but they strenuously oppose the alterations that have been made with the view of making it difficult for the negro to vote. Those changes were made by the Democrats for that particular purpose, and it is unfortunate that the constitution limits them.

It is quite natural that the Republicans should seek to guard their great political asset, the negro, from any suffrage interference. Every negro vote lost is a loss to the Republicans, and an election law that makes it difficult for the negro to vote, is, of course, to the disadvantage of that party.

But they are not honest in their opposition to it. They do not declare that they are fighting it because it deprives them of some of their negro votes, or that it is an infringement upon the rights of the negro. They announce that the ballots are so complicated that the average citizen bannot vote them, and try to impress the people with the idea that a man of ordinary intelligence cannot vote.

Such changes as have been made in the election law have been made with the negro to vote, and unfortunately some very good white citizens are confused, but they are not many, and the solicitous about but the baloved negro. and why don't they have the courage and manliness to admit, and henestly announce that they are opposing the election law because it does to some extent what it was intended to do, deprive the negro of his vote.

In marking the ballot you may take with you into the polling place any written or printed memorandum or paper to assist you in preparing your ballot, except a fac-simile of the ballot to voted. You must prepare and deposit your ballot without undue delay. Before coming from behind the curtain in front of your compartment you must fold your ballot in the same way as it was folded when you received it, so that the marks you have made upon it shall be entirely concealed. You then hand your folded ballot to the judge at the ballot box, give him your name and registered address, and wait until he tears off a coupon containing your name and number, and strings it, and then deposits your ballot in the ballot box. You must then leave the polling room and cannot again go behind the guard rail

during the day.

A voter who is physically disabled AT from marking his ballot, must make an affidavit to that effect if he desires assistance. The two polling clerks after such affidavit has been made, can accompany there mark his ballot as he instructs them, marking only the names of the candidates whom he shall name. The clerks are not allowed to read the ballot
