THE KENT COUNTY RAILROAD.

We have heretofore stated that the late session of the Delaware Legislature failed publish the following section of the law:

"That the said Kent County Railroad Company be and they are hereby authorized and empowered to extend and construct their said Railroad within the limits on the line dividing the States of Maryland and Delaware where the said railroad shall be located by the said Company to the Delaware Railroad, at any point not more than four miles from the place called Townsend on said road, which they may deem advisable, and by such route or routes as they may deem most eligible, and for that purpose may enter upon any land necessary for locating, laying out, or making the same or any part thereof, or timber for such use, and to obtain the right or title to the same as hereinafter
