THE NEWS OF THE WEEK.

Congress adjourned at noon on Wednesday. The closing scenes in both Houses were quiet and decorous. All the Appropriation Bills were passed and signed by the President. The bill to aid emancipation in Missouri was left hanging between the two Houses. The similar bill in relation to Maryland was not acted on in either House.

The Petersburg Express, of last Saturday, says that a great battle has been fought at Vicksburg, with heavy losses on both sides, but without any decided result. There is a later report, however, to the effect that the rebels were evacuating the town, but the particulars are not given. We have nothing direct from Vicksburg, and the Richmond papers of the 2nd give no news at all from that point. The Rebel report of a great battle there and the Memphis rumor that the city had been evacuated, are still therefore unconfirmed.
