The construction of this canal was begun on the 15th of April 1824 by Silas E. To Cost \$8,000,000. Estimates place the cost of widening the canal to 1000 feet and deepening it to thirty feet at about \$8,000,000. The expenditure of this comparatively small sum would reduce a 300-mile journey for big craft to fourteen miles, and

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
