NARROW ESCAPE

Blown From Launch By Gasoline Explosion.

Four men drifting helplessly in the 40-foot gasoline launch Nautillus, which was disabled near Bodkin Creek, off North Point Lights, narrowly escaped death about 2 o'block Sunday afternoon. when the gasoline tank of the launch suddenly exploded with a cannon-like report, almost blowing the launch out of the water. With their clothing ablaze, William Raynor and Basil Scott, of Linthicum Heights, and George B. Tyson and Edward S. Crosswaite, of Fairfield, the occupants of the launch were hurled flying through the air, dropping like blazing torches into the water about 20 feet from the boat. The sudden immersion fortunately extinguished the flames

All of the men could swim with the exception of Tyson, who soon began to show signs of distress. Wel could not discover the cause of the I suppose the accident was due to the fact that we were smoking at the time and possibly a stray spark ignited the gasoline. We were 10 miles from Ferry Bar when the explosion occurred. I have never had such a close call in my life before. We had no oars aboard and attempted to paddle the. boat with our hands, but soon became exhausted and gave up the attempt. Just as we were wondering when we would be rescued by a passing launch I saw a flash, which was followed by a deafening report like a discharge of a cannon. The next thing any of us knew we were struggling in the water.


