

Forbidding the Sale of or Giving Away Liquor on Election Day.

the following Act of the Legislature, passed March 24th, 1895, is published: AN ACT

Be it enacted by the General Assembly of Maryland, that it shall not be lawful for the keeper of any hotel, tavern, store, drink ing establishment, or any other place where liquor rectly, of any kind, on the day of election herein-SECTION 2. And be it enacted, That any person violating the provisions of this Act shall be liable indictment by the Grand Jury of the county conviction before any judge of any of the Circuit Courts of this State, be fined a sum not less than fifty dollars for each and every offense; one-half the fine is paid to the informer and the other half
