

right, driving in the picket connecting between him and the left of our old line on the Jerusalem plank road, and forcing back the two right divisions of Warren's corps. A heavy fight took place, resulting in the establishing of our lines and the capture of a good many prisoners. The prisoners were from Heth's and Hoke's divisions. We also captured a good many prisoners. A forgoing despatch was received from the Department. It was to the effect that the loss of the enemy was in killed, wounded, and of all much short of four does not exceed that number.

Provisional satisfactory intelligence from Sherman to 8.30 P. M. at 5 o'clock this morning from Sheridan's front represent all that time, and that Gilmore, who had entered Martinsburg last evening.

U. S. INTERNAL REVENUE.
INCOME TAX FOR 1863 AND ANNUAL TAXES FOR 1864.
The attention of tax-payers is hereby called to the provisions of the United States Excise Law relative to the assessment of annual taxes.

By the sixth section of the act of July 1, 1862 it is made the duty of all persons, partnership, firms, associations, or corporations, making lists to any annual duty, license, or tax on or before the first Monday of MAY IN EACH YEAR, to make a list or return to the Assistant Assessor of the District where located of the amount of annual income, the articles or objects charged with a special tax, and the business or occupation liable to pay any license.

Every person who shall deliver to an Assessor any false or fraudulent list or statement, with intent to evade the valuation or enumeration required by law, is subject to a fine of five hundred dollars; and in such case the list will be made out by the Assessor or Assistant Assessor, and from the valuation and enumeration so made there can be no appeal.

Payment of the annual taxes, except those for licenses, will not be demanded until the thirty-first day of June.

The appropriate blanks on which to make return, and all necessary information, will be furnished by J. H. Emerson, Assistant Assessor of the 5th Division, to whom the returns should be delivered on or before the first Monday of May, at his office, in Denton.
