REINS ON SALES TIGHTENED

Many Arrests In Jersey Raid-Campaign Started Upon Sale Of "Tonics"-Would Insure Legal Sales.

Washington.-The Senate Appropriations Committee was told that it is more dangerous to be in the prohibition enforcement service than it was to be an American soldier on the fields of France in the recent war. Wayne B. Wheeler general counsel of the Antisaloon League, appeared before the committee in support of larger appropriations for prohibition enforcement. Specifically he asked for enough money to pay field agents larger salaries than \$1,500 a year and insisted that the full amount of \$7.500,000 asked by Commissioner Kramer should be allowed. The House allowed \$7,-100,000, which was increased over \$6,-500,000, originally recommended by its appropriations committee.
