It is a significant sign of the times that the Republican leaders in such a stronghold of their party as Massachusetts find it necessary to hunt for candidates who can draw Democratic support.

Next week the registration officers will set in the various districts of the county for the purpose of registering voters. It is the duty of every citizen, Democrat or Republican, who is not registered and derives any benefit from organized society to have his name upon the book so that he can have a voice in the elections.

DR. HARRISON WAGNER, the champion litigator of Western Maryland, has been treated to a dose of his own medicine. The chief justice of the Frederick, Md., court directed the issue, against Wagner, of 703 attachments for contempt of court and Wagner has been arrested and lodged in jail, in default of \$10,000 bail.

The Easton Gazette takes the opportunity of saying, in tones of unmistakable authority, that Mr. A. L. Tharp is a candidate for State's attorney for Talbot, and that, if nominated by the Republican party, he will most certainly not decline the office. Mr. Mullikin is not a candidate, and is earnestly advocating Mr. Tharp's nomination.

There is the genuine flavor of old-fashioned Democracy in this remark of Congressman Holman. The current history of the Government demonstrates beyond question that not even the most sweeping retractions which have ever been made in our expenditures have embarrassed the public service for an hour; and, furthermore, that in a Government like ours there is no safe ground from severe economy and prodigal expenditure.

The wound was two or three inches long and an inch deep. The assailant has not yet been arrested.

Two Girls Clasp a Slanderer.—Martha and Mary Jones, two girls engaged in Philadelphia as domestics, but whose parents reside in Trenton, near Haddon, N. J., were spending several weeks at home during the absence of their employers at the seashore. Martha, the eldest of the sisters, became irritated at her character being assailed by Washington Banks, a young man living in the neighborhood, and the two sisters determined that he should not escape. They laid in wait for the slanderer, and as he was strolling by, Martha seized him by the throat and, without giving time for apology, applied her sturdy fist to his face till it looked as if he had been the sufferer in a regular boxing match.

Early on Sunday morning James L. Leary, living in the family of E. B. Gollop in Hill Pond, Kent county, Md., stabbed Gallop in the groin inflicting a wound that proved fatal in a few hours. The news of the killing spread among the employees of a cannery hard by, and a crowd of the workmen secured Leary and would have lynched him, but for the interposition of Leary's nephew, Jacob E. Krebs of Baltimore, owner of the cannery. Leary was then lodged in Chestertown jail. The quarrel had its origin in a quarrel between Gollop and Leary, in which the latter was kindly but firmly informed that he must not repeat the insulting language that he had used toward Mrs. Gollop the day before, because of her accidentally retaining a postal card belonging to Leary. Leary is known as an extremely dangerous man.

John Little, a colored brute, has been committed to jail at Centerville for trial at the November court, charged with brutally beating his wife. He had turned her out of the house on the 17th, but the next day persons persuaded her to return. He then cut her with hickory switches, with which he beat her until the blood ran from her in streams. Her son and his wife appeared and put an end to the beating.

On Saturday last the steamer Georgetown ran into the new wharf at Spencer's landing and cut in two near the middle, making a gap of 40 feet. The accident was caused by the engine getting on the centre and could not be backed. At the time several teams were on the outer end of the wharf, and their escape being cut off, they were put on the steamer and landed on the other wharf.

Five prisoners escaped from the Dover jail on Saturday night, and are still at large. Among the number were Bob Allen and Henry Rasin, notorious negro burglars, who were leaders of a gang which carried on extensive thieving operations in Kent county. The other half-bred escaped were Henry Watson, white, and Joe Cook and Israel Looote, colored.

Edward Atwell, a farmer who lives between Middletown and Townsend, was instantly killed at St. Anne curve on the Delaware Railroad, by a short distance below Middletown, shortly after 6 o'clock on last Saturday evening.

An engine and two cars passed over a child (name unknown) lying asleep between the rails on the Delaware Railroad near Harrington, last Saturday. The child was but slightly injured.

The Delaware Volunteer Militia will parade on the Fairview Park Ground September 27th, and a stand of national and State colors will be presented by Governor Stokely on behalf of the managers.
