BISHOP OF EASTON.

Rev. Dr. Drysdale Elected—His Subsequent Death.

The convention of the Diocese convened at St. Peter's Church in Salisbury at 12 M. Thursday. Rev. Dr. Theo. B. Barber, president of the Standing Committee, was in the chair, and the secretary, Rev. James A. Mitchell, and assistant, Mr. W. R. Walker, were present.

AN AWFUL EARTHQUAKE.

The Whole Atlantic Coast Shook—Charleston in Ruins.

At a few minutes before ten o'clock on Tuesday night the whole area of the Eastern and Southern States was violently shaken by an earthquake.

The first shock was felt approaching at 9.50 Tuesday evening, and, before people could realize what the trouble was, they were being thrown around and their houses were falling upon them.

The city is wrecked, the streets are encumbered with missiles of fallen bricks and tangled telegraph and telephone wires, and up to an early hour it was almost impossible to pass from one part of the city to another.
