Color over-plaids of plush on fine-wool color plaids; the over-plaids matching the under; not promiscuous.

Heavy fringes and other rony devices of mohair wicking woven on herringbone; colors mixed, interlacing, plain.

Wide diagonal, stripes of shaggy over-hanging matted wool. Serge more or less covered with net-work of mohair cords in zig-zags, spirals, curves, all over, in stripes, in clusters.

Stripes of nothing but beads, jet beads on black and colored fabrics. Blocks of Persian colors and figures on stripes of silk plush.

Doeskin covered with shaggy stripes of silk or mohair. Fine Persian figures in silk on wool, with massive stripes of plush.
