The Disease in Maryland. A recent article from the pen of Commissioner Coleman, of the Government Agricultural Bureau, says that the present national statutes are insufficient to meet the spreading havoc among the cattle. The trouble seems to grow out of the friction between the Federal and State laws. It seems next to impossible, he says, for officers obtaining their authority from two distinct sources to work together harmoniously in a service of this character, and I would recommend most emphatically either that sufficient au- in 1860. He enlisted in 1862 as work be left entirely to State authoriod is a most difficult thing to accomplish, even with the most rigid laws and the severest penalties.

Co-operation with the authorities of Maryland has been more satisfactory than with those of any other State. The local laws are good, and the work has been very largely in the hands of the inspectors of this department. The number of infected herds reported from this State is 196, containing 2,277 animals, of which 705 were diseased. Dr. Wray, the inspector who has been in charge of the work in Maryland since September 20, reported under date of December 7, that since the former date 122 herds, containing 1,354 animals had been put in quarantine, and that 92 herds, containing 1,089 animals, were still under such restrictions. Since July 1 this department has purchased and slaughtered in Maryland 308 diseased cattle, for which \$7,069 was paid, being an average of about \$23 per head.
