The President's Message.
President Cleveland's Message was sent to Congress on Tuesday. It is the shortest message since Buchanan's administration and unlike other documents of the kind dismisses the topics of less national interest in the presence of the one problem of supreme importance—the question of tariff revision.

The President estimates that the surplus revenue in the treasury, which in 1885 was less than \$18,000,000, and this in spite of the fact that the national bonds of the Government have been called and others not matured purchased at a premium, in all aggregating \$46,000,000. He points out the evils attending such a condition of affairs, and the dangers involved in a continued accumulation of money thus withdrawn from the channels of trade. He says that every expedient of relief that is clearly within the power of the Executive has been exhausted; for he does not regard as questionable the authority of the Secretary of the Treasury to go into the market and buy at a premium bonds not yet due.

On Friday last, President Grevy, of the French Republic, tendered his resignation and departed from Paris. He held on until he found it impossible to organize a government, then he handed in his checks. The financial interest pronounced in favor of M. Ferry as the successor of M. Grevy, but those in favor of a French Alliance bitterly opposed M. Ferry. In the Assembly M. de Freycinet was the favorite. Before his resignation President Grevy convened the Senators and Deputies to meet in Congress at Versailles on Saturday to elect a president.

The French Congress on Saturday at Versailles, on the second ballot, elected M. Sadi Carnot President of France, to succeed M. Grevy, resigned. The first ballot was as follows: Sadi Carnot, 303; Ferry 212; Gen. Saussier, 148; M. de Freycinet, 76; Gen. Appert, 72; M. Brisson, 20; Scattering, 28. After the first ballot, M. Ferry and M. de Freycinet withdrew in favor of M. Sadi Carnot, and on the second ballot he received 616 votes, which elected him. The election of M. Sadi Carnot gives great satisfaction throughout Republican France and Europe. He is moderate in his political opinions, but a sterling politician. The Rouvier cabinet was appointed temporarily, in order that the public business might progress. The new President qualified and entered at once on the duties of presidency.

Changes in the Cabinet.
WASHINGTON, Dec. 6.—The President sent the following nominations to the Senate to day: Lucius Q. C. Lamar, of Mississippi, to be associate Justice of the Supreme Court of the United States; William F. Vilas, of Wisconsin, to be Secretary of the Interior; Don M. Dickinson, of Michigan, to be Postmaster-General; Chase S. Fairchild, of New York, to be Secretary of the Treasury; George L. Rives, of New York, to be Assistant Secretary of State; Jesse H. Mendenhall, of New York, to be Assistant Secretary of the Treasury; Sigourney Butler, of Massachusetts, to be second comptroller of the treasury; James W. Hyatt, of Connecticut, to be treasurer of the United States.

"Senatorial courtesy," which has usually led to the compliment of a confirmation without reference to a committee when a Senator or ex-Senator has been nominated to any other office, has never prevailed in respect to nominations to positions on the bench of the Supreme Court. The latest case recording that of Mr. Lamar was that of Mr. Conkling, who had been out of the Senate a much shorter period than that of Mr. Lamar. Mr. Conkling's nomination was reported to the judiciary committee and sent back. He was confirmed by the Senate and then declined the office. It is probable that the nominations sent to the Senate today will not be formally laid before the body until the committees are formed.

THE teachers of the Kent County Del., Institute will hold their annual session at Smyrna on Wednesday, the 14th inst. A large force of eminent instructors will be present.

ALL right. The Herald has supported every attempt at tariff reform in the last dozen years. Bring on your bill, gentlemen. Senator Sherman in a published interview says—
The Democrats must do something. They are in possession of the body where alone a bill for raising revenue must originate. It is my opinion that some kind of a measure will go through the House. This will be sent to the Senate, and when we have got jurisdiction over the subject we will make a bill. I would not touch the tax on distilled spirits. I would reduce or abolish wholly the tax on tobacco. I would make the tax on sugar either nominal or wipe it out entirely. If wiped out I would offer a bounty for sugar raising. This would encourage the farmers of the land to raise beet sugar. I likewise favor the return to the States of the direct tax.

Mr. Carlisle gave his view to the Herald a few days ago.
In his judgment taxes ought to be reduced \$75,000,000, certainly not less than \$50,000,000. He might, as a compromise, agree to the abolition of the tobacco tax, but he would only do this in view of a corresponding reduction of customs duties of from \$20,000,000 to \$30,000,000. A great many articles now subject to duty should be placed on the free list and the rate on many others should be materially reduced.
