For instance we will take carpets protected by a tariff duty of \$40 on every \$100 worth produced; in spinning by the use of machinery one man does the work of 75 men, here the manufacturer (even if the) workman received every cent of the tariff duty on goods produced by his labor) would receive the tariff tax on the production of goods done by machinery, which would be equal to the labor of 74 men; the same applies to the manufacture of hats protected by a tariff of 75 per cent., and one man by the use of machinery doing the work of 9 men. In the production of coal where a miner used to get out two tons a day, by machinery 14 men get out 40 tons a day, which amounts to two and six-seventh tons per man per day, almost a ton more; and when we consider the hundreds of thousands of coal miners in the United States we can well understand how the tariff unjustly benefits the manufacturer to the extent of millions of dollars. 


