THE PITTSBURGH DISPATCH (Republican) says Governor Foraker, nominated for the third time a few days ago, will be defeated by a majority of from 30,000 to 50,000.
ACCORDING to the figures of the Superintendent of the P. W. & E. R. R. road the Delaware and Chesapeake will probably carry a much greater number of baskets of peaches than any other of the branch roads this year. This is additional evidence of the fact that Caroline county is fast becoming the peach centre of the Peninsula.
THERE is a Republican wonder in Wilmington, Delaware. The editor of the Morning News says he would no more ask for a public office than he would enter a man's house or a club house (to which he did not belong) without an invitation.
Now here's a chance for Barnum and Italy that they will not have again for four years at least.

INTEREST in the great contest between John L. Sullivan and Jake Kilrain reaches every hamlet in the land, and they do say that the outcome of the fight is discussed by Young Men's Christian Association in the cities, and that among the sombre college professors each has his favorite. Hundreds of thousands of dollars will change hands in the battle of the giants in the presidential contest in the future.
THE ORGAN of the Republican party of Talbot, the Eastern Gazette, recently admitted the leaders of that party that "should discussions arise they should be quelled." The Ledger takes the Gazette to task for such poor Republicanism.
IN view of the past workings of that party, the Ledger's strictures are groundless. Who has not heard of the Republican fiat: "Make it too hot for the colored man who votes for a Democrat?"

THE COUNTY COMMISSIONERS have decided to make the levy of the present year considerably lower than that of last year. The exact amount of the reduction will be determined next Tuesday. It is probable that it will be \$1, instead of \$1.15, on the \$100. This relief of the taxpayers could not come at a more opportune time. There has been a partial failure of all crops so far, and the prospect for the fall is not the brightest. The board is enabled to make this considerable reduction because of the large sums belonging to the county still unpaid. These amounts will be collected.
A PACKED JURY of seven negroes and five white men last week acquitted Dr. McDow of the murder of Captain Dawson, editor of the Charleston Courier. Dawson went to the office of Dr. McDow to warn him that his visits to a domestic in the editor's household must be stopped. McDow refused and a quarrel and fight ensued. In the scuffle the editor, although using no weapon, was shot down by the cowardly doctor who had disgraced his profession. A bought jury acquitted him. Two of the things which make Charleston an undesirable place for the abode of decent people are that purchasable jury material is found there, and that villains like McDow are allowed to live there.
IS THIS REPUBLICAN POLICY?
New York Times, Republican.
THE first important Republican State Convention held since the party recovered its control of both branches of Congress and of the Executive department of the government is that of Ohio, which met at Columbus on Wednesday last. It was natural to look to it for something in the nature of a "keynote" of Republican policy for the future. The most prominent and significant utterance of its platform is that which declares in favor of the "passage by Congress at its next session proper and equitable pension bills for honorably-discharged Union soldiers and seamen of the late war." What this means in an economical sense is sufficiently clear. It means disbursement among this favored class of citizens of much more than one-half of all the revenues drawn from the people by the power of taxation. It means not only the disposition of such surplus as the existing revenue laws might produce in largess to the "veterans of the war," but a large increase of the present taxes to meet the enormous requirements of such a policy.

WASHINGTON CORRESPONDENCE
Two Republican Senators Who Will Step Down—Fred Douglass' Appointment.
Now that the fiscal year has begun Republicans here are looking for the speedy discharge of every Democrat in the Government service, who is not protected by the civil service law, and as many of the latter as displaced Union veterans can be found to succeed under the recent order of Harrison.
Another negro has secured a prize. This time it is Fred Douglass, who has been appointed minister to Hayti. The appointment is creating much dissatisfaction among the rest of the darkies, with whom Douglass has been very unpopular ever since he married a white woman.
Sour Grapes—Don Cameron don't

want to be re-elected to the Senate. It was his father—Simon Cameron, now dead, who put him there and kept him there. Don would hardly be elected a county road supervisor if ability only was considered. Ditto—"granny" Blair, who has suddenly come to the conclusion that he will save the New Hampshire Legislature the trouble of defeating him by declining to again be a candidate for the Senate. The Senate will not find it difficult to survive the loss of these two men.
This is a "protection" administration. See how it protects American labor and capital! In giving out a contract for 550,000 enameled bricks to be used in the construction of the new National Library building in this city the contract was given to an English firm because by remitting the duty they can be delivered here a little cheaper than they can be bought in America. So could almost everything else, and the question naturally arises, why should the Government do what it refuses to let the people do?
The indictments against Dorsey, Brady, et al. in the famous Star route cases which have been cumbering the court records for seven or eight years have all been nolle prossed.
Blaine has told his man William Walter Phelps, just appointed minister to Germany, that he might take his own time about going to Berlin. But it is his own time he is taking; it is the people's. He qualified as minister the day he was appointed and his salary of \$17,500 a year began.

The new British minister evidently has no idea of making any such blunder as Lord Sackville, his immediate successor. He has bought a farm near his city, and not satisfied with having become a tax-payer in the United States he purposes to go with the President and his party to the Fourth of July celebration at Woodstock. If Sir Julian keeps on he will certainly be very solid with the "boys."
The Haytian Government recently captured an American steamer and for a time refused to release her, but were only too glad to do so and pay a cash indemnity of \$5,000 when Commander Kellogg of the U. S. S. Ossipee, gave them the choice of doing so or of having Fort-au-Prince bombarded. The money was paid and the vessel released. What sense there is in keeping news of this character from the public I cannot see.

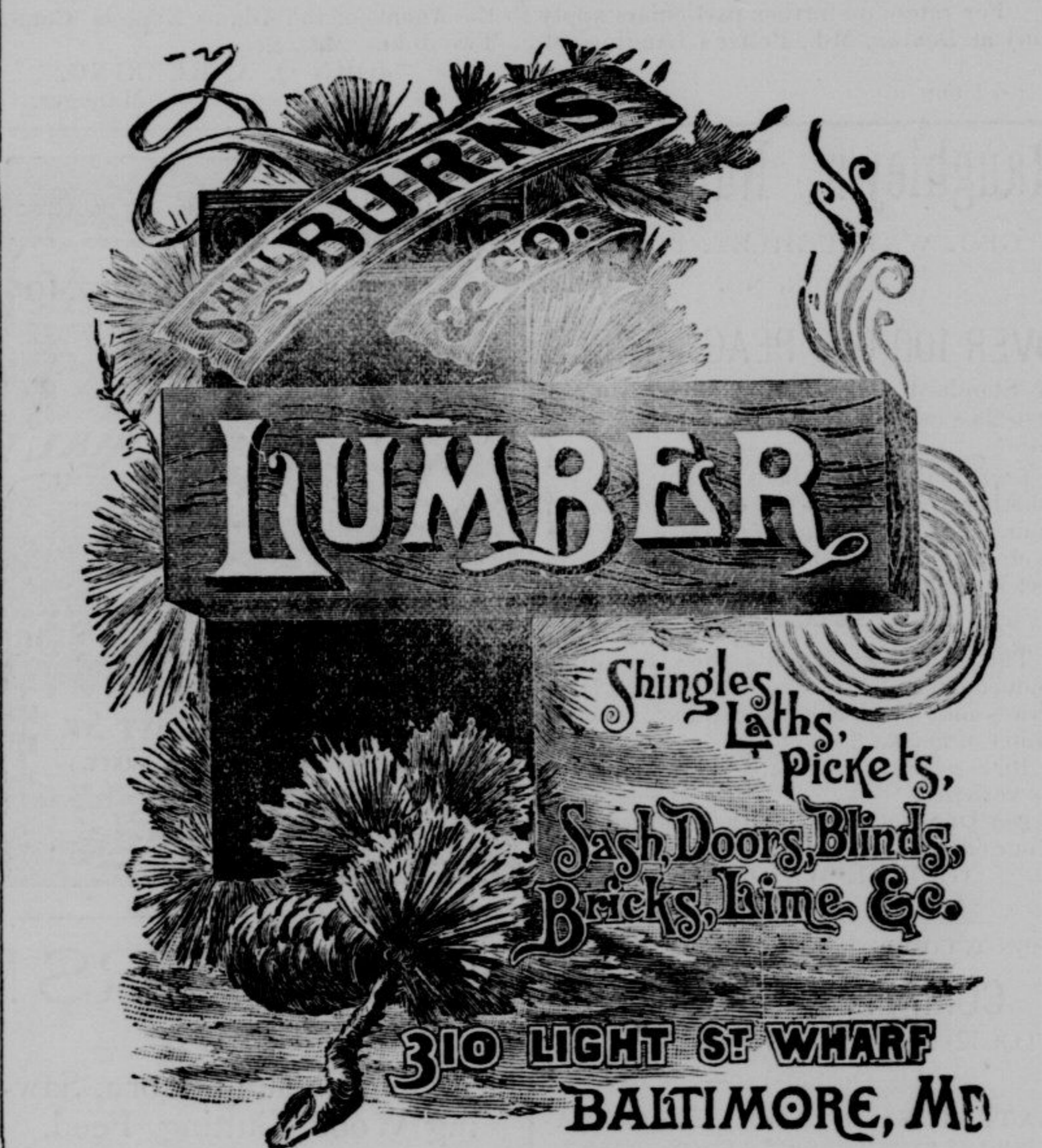
