SENATOR WILSON thinks the World's Fair of '92 should be held at Washington.

HALTIBORNE has a sweet potato trust. The members will endeavor to control the prices of that important commodity.

We do but simple justice to the Hon. E. K. Wilson when we say that he has discharged the duties of his high office with distinguished ability, and that he is eminently worthy of the continuance which we learn he desires.—Kent News.

QUEEN ANNE is a banner Democratic county. What a pity it would be to see its great majority reduced this fall simply because of had feeling among some of the prominent members of the party! Mr. Keating! Mr. Brown! Haul in your horns!

ELECTIONS are to be held this year in fifteen States. The four new ones, North Dakota, South Dakota, Montana, and Washington, are to choose their Congressmen, as well as State officers and legislators. Kentucky is to vote on Monday next, August 5, for State Treasurer. Ohio, Virginia, New Jersey, Massachusetts, Iowa, and Mississippi will elect Governors. In New York the Secretary of the State is the highest officer to be chosen; in Pennsylvania, the State Treasurer; in Nebraska, a Judge of the Supreme Court, and in Maryland, the Comptroller.

DAVID C. HERBERT, of Washington county, convicted of wife-beating, was thrashed by the sheriff on Monday last. This is the first time the act of 1832 in relation to wife-beating has been enforced in that county. A thick piece of leather two feet in length, tapering to the end, and joined to a wooden handle, was selected for the lash. The prisoner, after being stripped to the waist, was made to stand handcuffed to the bars of a door in the jail. Happily it is rare that the penalties of this statute—enacted only for the most depraved—have to be enforced.

IT HAS BEEN a time-honored custom of Republican administrations to appoint colored men as postmasters, clerks, etc., in the Southern States, where no votes were risked by so doing; but it was very rare that such positions in Maryland or Delaware were tendered to them. A notable exception is that of Alfred B. Johnson, a young colored man of the 9th ward, Wilmington, who has received the appointment of mail agent on the Baltimore and Delaware Bay Railroad. Our Republican friends propose to hold solid the majority colored vote if they lose a large part of the minority white vote in doing it.

THE "REPUBLICAN PROGRAM" is discussed in the Forum by the late speaker of the House of Representatives, Hon. John G. Carlisle. Part of that program, Mr. Carlisle thinks, will be to enact a federal registration and election law which will provide for several hundred thousand new officers, to be selected by a Republican President. To give this measure the appearance of impartiality and good faith, it will probably be made applicable to the whole country, but its real and only purpose will be to control the election in the Southern States; and it is there that the illegal and arbitrary proceedings of the ignorant and unscrupulous partizan officers will produce the most disturbance. The people in that section know from experience what to expect when the negro laborers are become the politicians and officeholders, and the passage of such a law will be resisted.

TO TAX the people heavily for the purpose of perpetuating this restrictive Republican policy, and then to use the revenue derived from such taxation to subsidize corporations engaged in the foreign carrying trade, is manifestly so absurd and unjust that it cannot be defended upon any rational ground except that of a generous disposition upon the part of members of Congress to give away other people's money. This is just what the Republican Party proposes to do, and Senator Morrill proclaims it without seeming to be aware of the absurdity of taxing imports to keep them out and paying the carrier a bounty to bring them in. In its frantic efforts to re-establish itself in power, the Republican Party bid high for the support of every dissatisfied element and every mendicant enterprise in the country, and the account must now be settled, no matter how illogical and absurd the proceeding may be.

JOHN G. CARLISLE. We have said out loud a number of times that we believed the Democrats would get this year in Maryland a majority much larger than the average. We were not saying it for buncombe, but as a matter of opinion based on a careful scrutiny of existing political facts, and a close review of the situation and the resolution of forces which will determine it.—Eastern Ledger.

THE STATE EXPOSITION will be opened in a little over a month from this date, and preparations for exhibits from the counties should be made without delay. Premiums await many of the farmers who have fine stock, fowls, and field products, but all these should be put in their best condition.

THE NEWS from all sections of the Peninsula is that the farmers are suffering from cloud-bursts and floods the like of which have not been known for many years. There is scarcely anybody exempt from the ruin of the waters. In many places farmers will have to buy breadstuffs before the coming of the next harvest.

Washington Budget. The harmony among the Virginia Republicans does not seem to be so complete as it did. Several of the Anti-Mahone people have been here "skicking" as hard as ever and intimating that it will be necessary to give them something nice in the shape of an office in order to make them as harmonious as Mr. Brady who got a \$4,500 position. It is also said that Langston, the negro who is now a contestant for a seat in Congress from the Fourth District (black belt), threatens to make trouble unless he is well taken care of. On the whole the Democrats do not think there will be much trouble in their carrying the State as usual. This is a free country, and yet every now and then the law steps in in some shape or other to give foreigners a somewhat queer idea of freedom. One of those cases has just been brought to light by a decision of the Treasury department that a book keeper brought from England by an English firm with a branch in New York City must be sent back to England, as his being brought over here under contract was a violation of the alien labor law. It was Gen. Grant, I believe, who said that the quickest way to get an obnoxious law repealed was to strictly enforce it. The administration is having a lively time with patronage in the South. Every appointment made raises a lot of wickers. The fight for the control of the patronage in Louisiana is red hot between Representatives-elect Coleman and Herwig, the Louisiana lottery man. It is to be settled at the convention which is to nominate a candidate for Congress to run in the district of the late Representative Gay. Herwig and Coleman both have been candidates and the quickest way to get the administration as the party boss in the State.
