IF THE REPUBLICAN CAMPAIGNERS are looking for instances of fraud upon the right of franchise, which fraud is patiently permitted by a dozen, we might easily refer them to the laws or more of our floating population who are employed in Baltimore, Smyrna and other places throughout the year, but are always "home" to vote on election day.

THE INCENDIARY SPEECHES made to the colored people by conscienceless campaigners—white and black—at the various colored school houses in the county may be, as it has been predicted, the cause of disturbance at the polls next Tuesday. The most direful threats have been freely expressed in the streets to the effect that the first colored man who votes for a Democrat will be severely dealt with. There is a good place behind the bars for black bulls of this ilk, and there they will find themselves if breeches of the law are undertaken.

ALTHOUGH FEW POLITICAL MEETINGS have been held in the county, except by the colored population, a good deal of quiet campaigning has been done, and there will likely be a full vote next Tuesday. The colored vote will be, as usual, practically unbroken and very few white Republicans will absent themselves on the day of election. They will all be out either to vote the ticket, or it may be, cast their ballots for some of the men of the very excellent Democratic ticket—men whose exceptional fitness will not be gained even by the Republicans. The Democrats will attend the election almost to a man. The interest in the success of the ticket permeates the whole organization. They will do very little counting. The prospect is that the entire ticket from Senator to Surveyor, will be elected by a good majority.

THE CAMPAIGN ORATOR and the campaign writer—many times he is simply the campaign liar—who does not state any facts on which to base his statements is everywhere at large. He talks or writes at random on every subject that his fancy lights upon. In Baltimore city he has often made the statement as an established fact that a large majority among the businessmen of that city are Republicans. In all probability such statements will be made today at the Republican meeting in Denton, when several Baltimore campaigners are to rehearse the same old yarn that the city is ruled by a lawless gang, and that no respectable business man belongs to the Democratic organization in Baltimore.
