The President's Recommendations. President Harrison sent his first message to Congress on Tuesday last. He recommends changes in the revenue laws which impose unnecessary burdens upon our people. To this end he desires that tax be removed from tobacco, and alcohol used in arts and manufactures. He follows the general Republican policy and favors federal supervision of elections for the South, and the Blair educational bill. He urges appropriations for coast defenses and for increasing the navy, and the subsidizing of ships to ply to South America, the Pacific Islands, etc. He favors the passage of a law to exclude all immigrants who shall be unable to prove a good moral character before a federal officer. The President advises that all soldiers who did "substantial service in the late war," and who are now "dependent upon their labor" for livelihood, be pensioned.

Should Mr. Harrison's ideas about service pensions, money grants of millions for schools and ship subsidies, etc., be enacted into law, the surplus which he now acknowledges to be a "disturbing element in the conduct of private business," will be too little to raise a disturbance.

THE COMMENT of the press of the country on the President's message is not as flattering as the administration would have it. The New York Times says: "To say that Mr. Harrison is timid in his treatment of the question of national policy would give only a hint of the truth. If we venture to say that he shows unmistakable cowardice we are still within the warrant of the facts."

According to the New York Sun, which opposed Cleveland in the Presidential election, "the message is a disclosure; and what it discloses is a President without ideas and an administration without a policy."

The Baltimore Sun says the message is "a clear and concise discussion of the matters treated, but of the breadth of view and national spirit it betrays the less said, perhaps, the better."

If the postmasters throughout the country should enforce the law in defiance of letters to parties through the postoffice, all girls under eighteen and boys under twenty-one years of age could not get a letter from the postoffice unless by order of their parents or guardians. Here is the law as it reads: All letters addressed to girls under eighteen years of age, or boys under twenty-one years of age, will be placed in care of their parents or guardians."

THE BALTIMORE REPUBLICAN FACTORS are engaged in a hand-to-hand fight over the postmaster's place. The candidates for the place are Noble Greager, Ex-Postoffice Inspector Henderson, and W. W. Johnson. The slate, which is most likely to come out of the scuffle intact, according to some Republican papers, is Uner for Collector, Wellington for sub-postmaster, Greager for postmaster and Garey of Caroline for postmaster.
