

GEORGE W. COVINGTON, Esq., of Kent county, was nominated at Glyndon Wednesday as the Congressional candidate of the Prohibition party of the First district.

SENATOR BENJAMIN SILVER, of Harford county, died unexpectedly at his home at Glendale last Saturday morning.

He was elected by the Democrats of Harford last fall, and was, with one exception, the youngest member of the Maryland Senate. His death caused the fourth vacancy in that body. Dr. Adams, of Baltimore, having died recently and Messrs. Urner and Burchinal having resigned to accept governmental positions.

PRESIDENT HARRISON on Tuesday last sent a special message to Congress in which he urged such legislation as will promptly enable the Postoffice Department to purge the mails of all letters, papers, etc., relating to the business of the Louisiana Lottery, as well as others that may subsequently be established. He points out the recent attempt to secure a charter from the State of North Dakota for a lottery company, the pending effort to renew the charter of the Louisiana Lottery, and the establishment of one or more lotteries at Mexican towns near our borders - pronounces them evils of vast proportions, and says the people of all States are debauched and degraded.

THE PROPOSED SHIP CANAL. Mr. M. S. Fletcher, of East New Market, has written to the Baltimore Sun concerning the proposal by private capital to construct a ship canal between the Chesapeake and Delaware bays by the Sassafras and Delaware rivers. Mr. Fletcher urges the superiority of the Choptank route, the advantages of which, in its comparative freedom from ice and other particulars, have frequently been pointed out in the Sun, and says he would suggest to the promoters of the Sassafras project to begin, it has, he says, some twenty-five miles of navigable water and can be connected with the Nanticoke by ten miles to Seaford. Del., some twenty miles, leaving a cut of some eighteen miles to Lewis and the Delaware Breakwater. The route has been surveyed and all the necessary information concerning it may be readily obtained. Mr. Fletcher incloses a letter from Congressman Gibson, in which the latter says: "I entirely concur in your views of the Choptank river route as the proper one for the canal. Should the measure present itself before the House at this session of Congress, or at any time during my term, it will receive my earnest support in the direction indicated."

Vacant Scholarships at St. John's and Western Maryland Colleges.

Notice is hereby given that the State scholarships due this county at St. John's College, Annapolis, and Western Maryland College, Westminster, are vacant, which the School Board, by and with the advice and consent of the State Senator from this county, is entitled to fill. Act of Congress Approved June, 1890, Granting Pensions to Soldiers and Sailors Who Are Incapacitated for the Performance of Manual Labor, and Providing for Pensions to Widows, Minor Children and Dependents - Important Modifications of Heretofore Existing Pension Laws.
