

TWENTY-SEVEN SOLDIERS and about two hundred and fifty Indians were killed in a fight at Wounded Knee Creek a few days ago.

EX-PRESIDENT CLEVELAND and Governor Hill, of New York, will attend a banquet given in Philadelphia on January 8th by the Young Men's Democratic Club of that city.

M. A. DAUPHIN, who for twenty years was president of the Louisiana Lottery Company, and who received more money letters than any other man in the United States, died in New Orleans on the 28th.

THE REPUBLICANS of Maryland are to assemble in Baltimore on the 21st inst. to adopt new rules and regulations of management. For some reason the Republican doctors find it difficult to agree on the kind of lymph which the grand old party needs to arouse it from its languishing.

IN MINNESOTA ten of twelve jurors can make up a verdict in a civil suit. This amendment to the State's constitution has been recently adopted. In that State it is no longer possible for one very wise man of the panel to upset a decision of eleven, as is sometimes the case in the courts.

THE REPUBLICANS of the State are to hold a convention in Baltimore on the 21st inst. Each county has been called upon to send delegates. In response thereto the Caroline central committee has issued a call for a county convention to be held in Denton on the 13th, which body will choose representatives to the State convention.

THE EASTERN SHORE RAILROAD is the latest blessing to Annapolis. The thought of our new connection with that most interesting and beautiful land, the Eastern Shore, is a warming one. The managers of the road displayed wisdom and enterprise in building, and will reap, as they deserve, large advantage in due time, in which benefits, Annapolis, with Baltimore and the Eastern Shore, has a large share.—Annapolis Record.

HON. CHARLES H. GIBSON'S friends—and they are legion—will be gratified to learn that his prospects for election to the Clerkship of the House of Representatives are very bright. All our people would rejoice at Mr. Gibson's success. The honor could not fall upon a worthier son of Maryland. The Washington correspondent of a leading daily paper says: "All the signs indicate that Representative Gibson is far ahead of his competitors at this stage of the game in the race for the clerkship of the next house. His friends are actively at work, and votes have been freely pledged him from every section of the Union—North, South, East and West."

THE FORCE BILL, in which some Republicans see such possibilities for their party, has been roughly handled in the United States Senate this week, and some of the Washington correspondents now say the measure is as dead as Chelsea. Senator Walcott on Tuesday denounced the bill and censured his colleagues for urging it upon the country to the exclusion of important legislation. The bill, he said, was a breeder of strife, it promised unwelcome interference with local liberties, it undertook to put the inferior race in the saddle and it threatened the present material prosperity of the South. If the Chinese in Colorado were numerous enough to control the State on a fair vote, and were on the point of getting control, he for one, said the Senator, would favor taking the necessary steps to keep power in the hands of the whites. Senator Teller opposed the force bill because it delayed financial legislation and complained that its advocates were proposing a gag rule to prevent necessary amendments. He might vote for the force bill if properly amended, but for its friends would press it to its passage with all its faults uncorrected. Senator Hale also criticized the management of the bill and objected to it on the ground that it obstructed financial legislation.
