SPECIAL FAVOR TO NONE. The Baltimore Sun in its issue of Tuesday denounces in its leading editorial the taxation of mortgages, and among other things says:

"The taxation of mortgages is double taxation in its worst form, falling upon the class in the community least able to bear it, viz. those whose necessities compel them to become borrowers. Take the case of a man who is actually worth \$5,000 and no more. Being industrious and enterprising he buys a farm assessed at \$10,000, hoping to pay for it in a few years by hard work and careful saving. He invests in the purchase his own \$5,000 and borrows \$5,000 more from a neighbor, which he secures by a mortgage upon the farm. It is rather rough upon the pretext of taxing him according to his "actual worth," to tax him upon the whole \$10,000, the \$5,000 that he is worth and the \$5,000 that he is not worth, but it is not so rough as the tax upon the mortgage also is still worse off. Nobody is compelled to lend money upon mortgage, and whenever a tax upon a mortgage is levied, the man who lends upon mortgage and who wishes to receive his lawful interest, without deduction or abatement, is careful to stipulate that the borrower shall pay that tax."

It would not be strange to find such an argument in some newspapers; but when we see such in the columns of one of the best and most intelligent papers of the State—papers, too, that is usually the ready champion of the people's rights and interests, it is, to say the least, unfortunate. We believe the time has come when the opportunity should cease for people to invest their money in such a way as to make no contribution toward defraying public expense.

It is evident that the exemption from taxation of mortgages, the best securities on earth, does encourage mortgaged people to so invest that they may escape paying their just share of taxes. Why should we make mortgagors a favored class and, notwithstanding the millions they control, say to them, you ought not and must not pay taxes? Do we really mean that they shall enjoy every privilege and protection that our country affords, which have allowed them to foster fortunes in such investments, and thus excuse them from defraying one penny of the expense that is consequent upon such privileges and such protection?

Take the case of the young man who pays taxes on a \$10,000 farm, on which there exists a mortgage for \$5,000. Suppose both sums are taxed; then the mortgagee pays on an investment of \$5,000, which is just right. The young man pays on \$10,000, but the taxes of the young man decrease as soon as that mortgage begins paying a tax. The result is double taxation, but it is much better for the young man because he pays less taxes. Justice is carried out when that lien is reached and made to pay a part of the community's expense, so we have done a good thing for the young man and a just thing for the mortgagee. The cry that the young man would have to pay the tax anyhow is too ridiculous to notice. With a State and county tax of \$1 on the \$100 then the investment would yield 5 per cent. clear, and who would not rather lend money at 5 per cent. on a mortgage that at 6 per cent. in any other way?

EDITORIAL NOTES. After most people in this broad land have accepted as philosophically as they could the fact that a very heavy and needless advance on tin goods has been made, a few of our newspaper friends in the Republican party still refuse to believe it. These gentlemen ought not to so discredit the Postmaster-General of the United States. He is said to be a good Republican, and ought to have enough faith in him to accept what he says without discount.

"Tinware is advancing in cost, and very soon the manufacturers will have their way and you and we will have to pay very much more. In view of this state of things we made some time since a large purchase of kitchen tinware at what was a low price then, and would be far lower now in the face of two advances in market price list. This lot goes on sale today at prices that will not be soon again for a long time to come."

Hear also what the New York Tribune says in a recent issue: "In May last the plates known as L. C. B. V. were quoted in the market at \$4.30 per box, and the same grade now sells at \$5.40, an advance of more than 25 per cent."

A New York auctioneer writes us concerning a new plan for the disposal of peaches in that market. He proposes to sell them at auction as is now done on the fruit exchanges of the Peninsula. As is always required at a public sale the competition is sharper and the prices higher than at the commission stores. "During last year," he says, "I received from various shippers in California and sold by public auction 573 carloads of California fruit, consisting of peaches, pears, plums and grapes. The varieties were divided as follows: Peaches, 142,192 packages; plums, 59,144 packages; grapes, 121,490 packages, for which was realized the magnificent sum of \$803,514.54, or an average of \$1,402.29 per car. I have just returned from a lengthened visit to California, and although the crops there will be of the usual fair average, I can see nothing to injure the prospect of your local crop."
