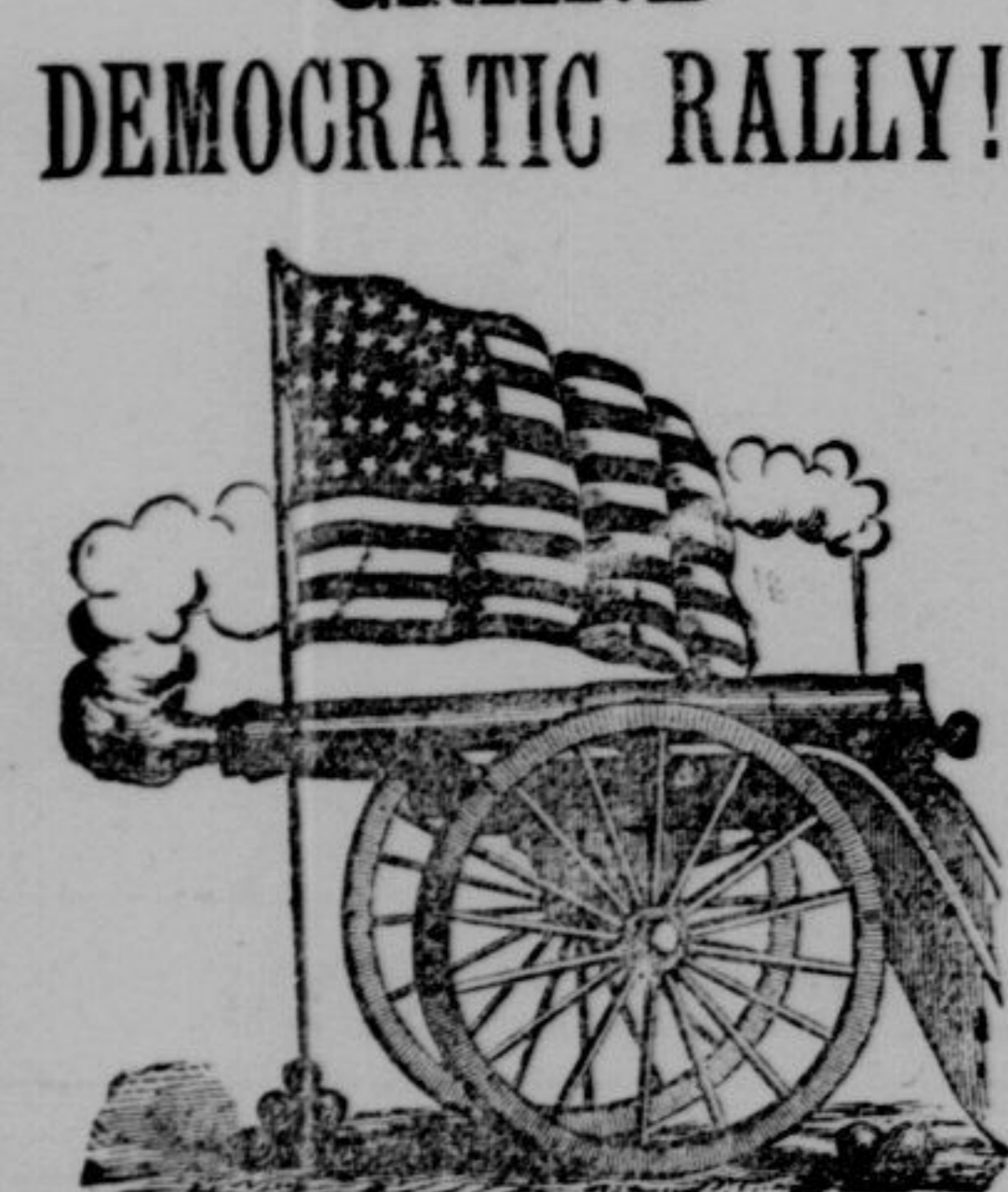

Tuesday, the 3d Day of November, 1891, (being the first Tuesday after the first Monday of said month) at the usual places of voting in the several election districts of Caroline County, as follows:

- For the First district at GREENSBOROUGH; For the Second district at HILLSBOROUGH; For the Third district at DENTON; For the Fourth district, Precinct No. 1, at HARMONY; For the Fourth district, Precinct No. 2, at PRESTON; For the Fifth district at FEDERALSBURG; For the Sixth district at HILLSBOROUGH.

CHAPTER 195.

AN ACT to amend section forty-eight, of article three, of the Constitution of this State.

SECTION 1. Be it enacted by the General Assembly of Maryland, Three-fifths of all the members of the two Houses concurring, that the following section be and the same is hereby proposed as an amendment to the Constitution of this State, and if adopted by the legal and qualified voters thereof as herein provided, it shall supersede and stand in the place and instead of section forty-eight of article three of said Constitution.

CHAPTER 196.

AN ACT to amend section forty-eight, of article three, of the Constitution of this State.

SECTION 1. Be it enacted by the General Assembly of Maryland, Three-fifths of all the members of the two Houses concurring, that the following section be and the same is hereby proposed as an amendment to the Constitution of this State, and if adopted by the legal and qualified voters thereof as herein provided, it shall supersede and stand in the place and instead of section forty-eight of article three of said Constitution.

CHAPTER 197.

AN ACT to amend section seventeen, of article two, of the Constitution of this State.

SECTION 1. Be it enacted by the General Assembly of Maryland, Three-fifths of all the members of the two Houses concurring, that the following section be and the same is hereby proposed as an amendment to the Constitution of this State, and if adopted by the legal and qualified voters thereof as herein provided, it shall supersede and stand in the place and instead of section seventeen of article two of said Constitution.
