ARE THE BEST AND CHEAPEST! They are cheaper than the barbed wire. The guards we use hold the wires in place, so that nothing larger than the space between them can crawl through. These guards hold the wires together, so that if a staple gets pulled out the wires will not sag, and one wire sustains the other. It is strong and elastic, and good-looking. For those who prefer it we use barb wire, as the guards and stretches can be worked equal-
