Strawberry Culture.

The Baltimore American of a recent date had the following on strawberry culture: Owing to the heavy April rains washing off the bloom the strawberry crop has been cut short and the weed and grass in and between the plants increased. Old beds should be plowed down and planted in corn, tomatoes or cabbage. One or two year old beds of choice varieties, if not two grassy, should be cleaned out. This can be done by throwing a furrow with the light cabbage plow from each side of the row of plants into the middle of the row, making a slight ridge. Leave the ridges for be smothered out. When the grass and weeds are rotten, level the ridges with the one-horse harrow, going and grass brought to the surface should be forked off. Plantains, inch hoe. It is an excellent hoe for this purpose, heavier than the ordinary hoe and not as heavy as the mattock. The weeds can be cut between the plants quite rapidly and without injuring many strawberry

to handle the hoe properly. Spring-planted strawberry beds will require extra cultivation—two to three hand hoeings to keep 'the rows clean and the soil mellow.
