CHURCH FEDERATION COMING.

The Baltimore Herald of Wedneslay says: Rev. Dr. F. T. Tagg, president of the General Conference of the Methodist Protestant Church and editor of the Methodist Protestant, returned from North Carolina yesterday evening, where he had been attending the North Carolina conference of his church. He was asked this morning for his impression of the Interchurch Conference on Federation, to which he was a

He said: "In my opinion, it was the greatest church conference held for several generations. I have taken part in many large church gatherings, in this country and Europe, but I have never attended one I thought so fraught with important results as this one.

"Remember, at this conference Biggest there were gathered 1,000 delegates. representing thirty-three denominations. These denominations have been separated by their different creeds and forms of church government so long and widely that it was thought by many that there could be no union. But when we gathered there and the subject of federation was discussed it was found that we agreed upon every essential, and only differed upon those things that are of minor importance. 


