This is the attitude that, in the long run, will do more to advance the welfare of labor than anything else.


The Right Answer

Congress will be called upon to consider a plan to add more than 10,000,000 people to the social security rolls. These would include self-em ployed families, farm and domestic workers not now covered, and professional people-physicians, lawyers,

For one thing, it would mean more and more govern ment involvement with the lives of more and more people, whether they desired it or not-and certainly, one of the greatest needs of the time is to limit government, to call a halt to paternalism and socialism, and to return to those concepts of local and individual responsibility and independence upon which this government was \ founded and which made us \$ strong. For another thing, ? almost all authorities are agreed that the present social security system is about as unsound as anything now working on plans to dra stically revise it. 
