Average Allotment Worth Apply to Fall Wheat

Wheat average allotments and marketing quotas will not apply to wheat to be seeded this fall and harvested in 1945. The Secretary has determined that the total supply of wheat following the 1947 harvest will be less than 12 percent of the amount required for domestic consumption and export in view of the world food situation. The Department of Agriculture has set the 1947 goal of 11,700,000 acres—a 20-25 percent increase over the amount planned for harvest in 1946. The proposed average will be for the period August 1, 1944.
