This year it is declared that the points which the independents contended for have been gained and there is no longer any just complaint which should cause real Democrats to abandon their party. One of the complaints against the Democratic party in Queen Anne's was local boss rule. This complaint has been remedied, it is said, by the adoption of the plan of direct nominations at the primaries. The Democratic ticket now before the people of Queen Anne's is reported to be a most excellent one, and it was nominated by the people, and not by any boss. The so-called "Independent ticket," on the other hand, was nominated without even the pretense of a primary. It is a purely boss-made ticket, the boss this time, according to the public understanding, being Mr. James T. Bright and not Mr. John E. George. Under these circumstances it is difficult to understand how such a ticket can receive the support of any sincere and real independent, opposed as it is by a ticket nominated by the people at fair and open primaries.

"But be this as it may, the situation in Queen Anne's at this time seems to be this:
 "An organization which was formed two years ago for a local purpose and for the righting of alleged local wrongs, having no relation whatever with state or judicial affairs, is being used for the purpose of turning the state over to the Republican party, to aid in the election of Republicans to represent Maryland in the Senate of the United States, to put two Republican Judges on the bench in the Second circuit, and to put negroes in the jury boxes in five counties. The question is whether any man calling himself a Democrat, regular or independent, will lend himself to any such purpose as this when there is no cause for such action. Will any Democrat allow himself to be led into the Republican party, body, soul and breeches, by Mr. Bright? And, by the way, why is Mr. Bright so strong for Congressman William H. Jackson that he should desire to give Queen Anne's county into his keeping?"
