New Deal Sweeps The Nation

CECIL COUNTY VOTERS JOIN IN DEMOCRATIC LANDSLIDE— GOLDSBOROUGH VICTORIOUS

Cecil County Voters Fall In Line To Endorse Roosevelt And New Deal By Huge Majority. Nation Again Sweeps Democrats Into Power

GOLDSBOROUGH AGAIN CARRIES COUNTY

Cecil county joined in the mighty parade of votes with every section of the United States to return Franklin Delano Roosevelt back to the White House for another four year term. Never in the history of the country was a candidate for the presidency of the United States given such an overwhelming vote as that piled up by the New Deal President in last Tuesday's election. Forty-six of the forty-eight States, with a total electoral vote of 523 were swept into the Roosevelt column in the avalanche that by far exceeded his unprecedented vote of 1932. In Maryland, the six Democratic Congressional candidates were swept into office by great majorities on the presidential wave.

The early returns on Tuesday evening indicated another Roosevelt landslide, but few experts in forecasting elections looked for the complete rout of the Republican standard bearer. Pennsylvania for the first time in 80 years went Democratic as did such other rock-ribbed Republican states as Delaware, Conneticut and New Hampshire. Vermont and Maine, with a total of eight electorial

votes went to the Landon-Knox ticket. In practically every precinct in the county the President showed a big gain over his record vote of 1932. The increase in votes clearly demonstrated the popular trend in the county for the New Deal and the policies of the Roosevelt Administration. 


