Caravaners Plan to Capture the State for Suffrage—To Emulate Miss Shaw's Method of Campaigning.

PLANS for county campaigning are developing rapidly. The prairie schooner is built "on paper." For the past week Baltimore has been "combed" for illustrations of the picturesque conveyance, and the problems of construction, horses and all other details have been faced and discussed. Miss L. C. Trax, chairman of the County Campaign Committee, has called a meeting for Wednesday morning, 10,30 o'clock, March 3, at Just Government League Headquarters. At that time it will be definitely determined which sections of the State will be visited. Among the "caravaners" will be Miss Trax, Mrs. C. N. Gabriel, Mr, and Mrs. F. F. Ramey, Mrs. C. D. Warfield and Miss Marjory Matthews.

Project Economical and Far-Reaching in Results.

In speaking of the work Miss Trax said: "The caravan trip seems to have gripped the imagination of our suffragists. Dr. Anna Shaw made her first tours in a prairie schooner, and it is like a delightful reminiscence, now that we are so near victory, to travel once more in the bulging, canvastopped wagon. The emotions of peoples are stronger than their logic. The schooner, the sleeping tent, the camp fire and the great outdoors make a charming picture. Add to this the zest of spreading suffrage propaganda in hitherto untouched communities, and the sentimental appeal of this journey is irresistible.
